## Glossary

**Barrier:** personal or circumstantial factors (e.g. substance misuse, having a disability, suffering mental health illness, being a young carer or parent, etc.) that prevent individuals from moving on with their lives.

**Care leaver:** a person aged 25 or under, who has been looked after by a local authority for at least 13 weeks since the age of 14; and who was looked after by the local authority at school-leaving age or after that date.

**Children in care/ Looked after children:** a child who is being looked after by their local authority. They might be living with foster parents, at home with their parents under the supervision of social services or in residential children's homes.

**EET:** Employment, Education or Training.

**Lack basic skills:** young person who lacks basic literacy and numeracy skills (e.g. experiences difficulty in reading, writing, using numbers).

**Identify as minority ethnic:** identify as part of a group within a community which has different national or cultural traditions from the main population.

**NEET:** a young person who is no longer in the education system and who is not working or being trained for work.

**SEND:** Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

**Young carer:** young person aged 18 or under who helps to look after a relative with a disability, illness, mental health condition, or drug or alcohol problem.

**Young parent:** any person aged between 15- 24 years old who is expecting a baby or has a child.

**Annex J:** A form a young person completes on exist, young people who have not completed this form have left the project voluntarily with out contacting their Adviser.
